#### What the \*\*\*\* is Normal? Francesca Martinez



Francesca is a brilliant, award-winning comedian who just happens to have cerebral palsy. She will be talking about her book, What The \*\*\*\* is Normal, a warm, funny coming-of-age memoir about her refusal to be pigeon holed as disabled - she describes

herself as 'just wobbly' - and her inspiring determination to succeed as a comic a career.

She has had many sell-out runs at the Edinburgh Festival and internationally, including the Melbourne Comedy Festival, the Adelaide Fringe Festival, the Perth Festival, and the Just For Laughs Festival in Montreal. In 2013 she completed a 68-date UK tour and has had off-West End London runs at the Tricycle Theatre (twice), the Hackney Empire, and the Soho Theatre. She has challenged the government in a number of TV interviews, including on Newsnight and This Week. In April 2014, she was named as one of Britain's most influential women in the BBC Woman's Hour power list 2014.

#### The Story of Alice Robert Douglas-Fairhurst



Following his acclaimed life of Dickens, **Robert Douglas-Fairhurst** illuminates the tangled history of two lives and two books. Drawing on numerous unpublished sources, he examines in detail the peculiar friendship between the Oxford mathematician Charles Dodgson

(Lewis Carroll) and Alice Liddell, the child for whom he invented the Alice stories, and analyses how this relationship stirred Carroll's imagination and influenced the creation of Wonderland. It also explains why Alice in Wonderland (1865) and its sequel, Through the Looking-Glass (1871), took on an unstoppable cultural momentum in the Victorian era and why, a century and a half later, they continue to enthrall and delight readers of all ages.

Robert Douglas-Fairhurst is a biographer and critic who is a Fellow and Tutor in English at Magdalen College, Oxford. He is the author of Becoming Dickens (Harvard UP, 2011), which was awarded the 2011 Duff Cooper Prize, and Victorian Afterlives (OUP, 2002), and has also produced editions of Dickens's Christmas stories, Henry Mayhew's London Labour and the London Poor, and Charles Kingsley's The Water-Babies for Oxford World's Classics. He writes regularly for publications including the Daily Telegraph, Guardian, TLS, Art Newspaper and New Statesman. Radio and television appearances include Start the Week and The Culture Show, and he has also acted as the historical consultant on BBC productions of Jane Eyre, Emma and Great Expectations.

#### Rêverie - Debussy's Diaries Lucy Parham and Simon Russell Beale CBE



Written to celebrate the life of Claude Debussy, Rêverie is a biographical programme of the composer's words and music compiled and scripted by pianist Lucy Parham.

The narrative of Rêverie, which takes the form of a personal journal, follows him from his initial success with the Prix de Rome in 1885 to his untimely death in 1918, punctuated with solo piano works ranging from the ever-popular lyricism of Clair de Lune, Rêverie and The Girl with the Flaxen Hair to such virtuosic showpieces as Jardins Sous La Pluie, the Etudes and L'Isle Joyeuse.

**Lucy Parham** is a Professor at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama. She first came to public attention as the Piano Winner of the 1984 BBC TV Young Musician of the Year, and she has since appeared regularly at all the major concert venues in London and around the UK. She is a regular contributor to The Guardian and appears frequently as a broadcast presenter and guest on BBC Radio 3 and 4.

Simon Russell Beale CBE is one of the most critically acclaimed talents in British theatre, and a multi award-winning actor. He made his name at the RSC in the 1980s. Since 1995 he has been a regular player at the National Theatre, a BBC radio and television actor and presenter. He has won two Laurence Olivier and BAFTA awards.

#### The Waste Land Dame Harriet Walter with Orchestra of the Swan Quartet



We mark 50 years since the death of TS Eliot with a reading of what many believe to be one of the most important poems of the 20th century, accompanied by the haunting Quartet for the End of Time by Messiaen.

**Dame Harriet Walter** is one of the country's most respected

actresses. She has worked extensively in theatre, television, film and radio and is appearing at the RSC in Death of a Salesman. Her many roles with the RSC, where she is an Associate Artist, include Cleopatra in Antony and Cleopatra, Beatrice in Much Ado About Nothing, Lady Macbeth opposite Anthony Sher, Brutus in Julius Caesar and Henry in Henry IV. She won the Evening Standard Award for her role as Elizabeth in Phyllida Lloyd's production of Schiller's Mary Stuart and a Tony nomination on Broadway in 2009. Her best known TV roles include Harriet Vane in Lord Peter Wimsey series. Law and Order UK and Downton Abbey, and her numerous film credits include Young Victoria, Atonement, Babel, Bright Young Things, Sense and Sensibility and Louis Malle's Milou et Mai.

Orchestra of the Swan is based in Stratford and is Associate Orchestra at Town Hall Birmingham. It performs all over the UK and Associate Artists include Tasmin Little, Julian Lloyd Webber, Benjamin Grosvenor and Tamsin Waley-Cohen. OOTS received the prestigious Royal Philharmonic Society 'Composer in the House' award and has recorded extensively.

Douglas Hurd retired as Foreign Secretary in 1995 after a distinguished career in government spanning 16 years, holding many cabinet posts including Secretary of State for Northern Ireland and Home Secretary. He has written several novels, as well as biographies

of other great politicians including Peel and Disreali.

As an fearless young Conservative politician in the seventies and eighties, one who witnessed the fall of Heath and the triumph and eventual decline of Thatcher, **William Waldegrave** was firmly at the heart of one of the most exciting and tumultuous periods of modern British history. However just as his star was in the ascent, Waldegrave became embroiled in a scandal which tarnished his reputation, but could not dampen his voracious enthusiasm for the political game. One of the most fiercely intellectual governmental figures of the modern age, he gives an unembroidered account of the narcotic effect of politics in his much anticipated autobiography, A Different Kind of Weather.

(Ending the Mercenary Society and Building a Great Country) Britain is beset by a crisis of purpose. For a generation we have been told the route to universal well-being is to abandon the expense of justice and equity and so allow the judgments of the market to go

#### Jakob's Colours by Lindsay Hawden
