He's now turned his sights on the most famous band in the world with One Two Three Four: The Beatles in Time. a captivating biography of the Fab Four that combines intriguing detail of the band's day-to-day lives with broader questions about their impact on the world around them.

David Barrie Animals - Incredible Journeys

A Fellow of the Royal Institute of Navigation and a member of the Royal Cruising Club, he will be looking at the wonders of animal navigation, explored in his book, *Incredible Journeys*, and the impact modern technology will have on their natural instincts in future.


Miles Jupp A Man of Many Talents Baillie Gifford Auditorium, Play House

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




Tim Bouverie Appeasing Hitler
