












lain Dale and Steve Richards 'All Political Careers End in Failure' -What it Takes to be PM

The bestselling historian, Charles Spencer, evokes the harsh and brutal story of a dead heir, a civil war of untold violence, and a game of thrones which saw families turned in on each other - and how the course of British history changed overnight.

Matthew Parris Fracture - Stories of How Great Lives Take Root in Trauma 8.00pm | £12 | Stratford Play House

The Times columnist and BBC Radio 4 Great Lives presenter explores a common theme that emerges from his landmark radio series: that many geniuses who have influenced our lives share a common experience childhood trauma so severe that it should have broken them completely. He'll be taking a long look at their lives and making the case for such towering influencers as Ada Lovelace, Frederick Douglass, Vladimir Lenin, Marie Curie. Frieda Kahlo, Carl Jung, and Tupac Shakur, and asking if they succeeded not only in spite of their backgrounds. but perhaps even because of them.



Michael Taylor and Amelia Gentleman Britain's Colonial Past -A Legacy of Shame

But was abolition as enthusiastically embraced as we want to believe, and how does our welcome to the Windrush generation sit alongside the revelations about the deportation betrayal? The leading specialist on colonial history. Michael Taylor and Amelia Gentleman, the awardwinning journalist who revealed the Windrush Scandal, talk about the West India Interest - resistance to abandoning slave ownership supported by nearly every leading figure of the British establishment of the day - and the lasting and pervasive conflict between the opinions in our past and discomfort with our actions in our present. 


